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## NEW JERSEY VOTERS BACK WAGE FREEZE, NIX GAS TAX HIKE, QUINNIPIAC UNIVERSITY POLL FINDS; VOTERS SPLIT ON RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA

New Jersey voters support 53 - 42 percent a wage freeze for state workers, but oppose 65 - 33 percent raising the gas tax to balance the state budget, according to a Quinnipiac University Poll released today.

A total of 87 percent of voters say New Jersey's budget problems are "very serious" or "somewhat serious," the independent Quinnipiac (KWIN-uh-pe-ack) University poll finds.

By a 57 - 32 percent margin, voters say cut services rather than raise taxes to balance the budget. Voter opinions on possible options are:

- Oppose 57 38 percent layoffs for state workers;
- 48 percent oppose state worker furloughs, with 43 percent in favor;
- Support 55 40 percent reduced pension benefits for new state workers.

None of the listed sub-groups wants to raise the gas tax. Opposition ranges from 56-42 percent among Democrats to 77-21 percent among Republicans.

In an open-ended question, allowing for any answer, 26 percent of New Jersey voters cite taxes as the top priority for Gov. Christopher Christie and the State Legislature, with 18 percent naming the economy or jobs, 16 percent listing education and 5 percent citing the state budget or spending.

"While the George Washington Bridge scandal dominates the headlines, voters are starting to recognize that the budget squeeze is a big problem and they're prepared to look at cuts in public-employee pensions," said Maurice Carroll, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Poll.

"Sure it's a labor-friendly state, but voters would consider limiting benefits for public employees. Layoffs? No. Furloughs? It's close. And a bit more than half of voters would support a wage freeze."

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"One thing that unites all voters in this most partisan state is opposition to a gas tax hike," Carroll said. "We're all against it."

## **Recreational Marijuana**

With yawning gender, age and partisan gaps, New Jersey voters are divided 48-48 percent on the issue of legalizing possession of small amounts of marijuana for personal used.

Men support legalization 54 - 43 percent, with women opposed 52 - 43 percent. Voters 18 to 29 years old are for it 56 - 43 percent, with voters over 65 years old opposed 63 - 33 percent. Democrats are for legalization 55 - 41 percent, with Republicans opposed 61 - 34 percent. Independent voters are divided with 48 - 48 percent.

Only 41 percent of New Jersey voters, including 56 percent of voters under 30, acknowledge that they've smoked marijuana.

Marijuana is just as dangerous as alcohol, 49 percent of voters say, while 16 percent say it is more dangerous and 31 percent say it is less dangerous.

Marijuana use does <u>not</u> lead to other drug use, New Jersey voters say 50 - 42 percent.

If personal marijuana possession were legal in New Jersey, 60 percent of voters say it would <u>not</u> bother them if a neighbor grew marijuana in their home.

But 87 percent of voters say they would be "somewhat uncomfortable" or "very uncomfortable" riding in a car driven by someone who had consumed a moderate amount of marijuana.

"There's enormous interest in the proposal to legalize marijuana, but voters split down the middle. Republicans say no; Democrats say yes and the highest support comes from younger voters," Carroll said.

"Most New Jerseyans think that alcohol is as dangerous or more dangerous than marijuana. If their neighbor wanted to grow marijuana, most wouldn't object but almost nobody would want to ride in a car driven by a pot smoker."

From April 2-7, Quinnipiac University surveyed 1,356 New Jersey voters, with a margin of error of  $\pm 2.7$  percentage points. Live interviewers call land lines and cell phones.
