NEW YORK STATE VOTERS NIX MAYORAL CONTROL OF SCHOOLS, QUINNIPIAC UNIVERSITY POLL FINDS; VOTERS TRUST UNIONS MORE THAN GOVERNOR ON SCHOOLS

New York State voters say 52 - 36 percent that the New York City mayor should <u>not</u> have control of the public schools in the city, according to a Quinnipiac University poll released today.

New York City voters support mayoral control of the public schools 54 - 40 percent, with opposition at 58 - 23 percent upstate and 61 - 27 percent among suburban voters, the independent Quinnipiac (KWIN-uh-pe-ack) University Poll finds. Democrats support mayoral control of the schools 51 - 37 percent with opposition at 65 - 24 percent among Republicans and 57 - 31 percent among independent voters.

Voters statewide trust the teachers' unions more than Gov. Andrew Cuomo to improve education in New York State 54 - 31 percent. Support for the unions is strong among all groups except New York City voters, who back the unions over Cuomo slightly 47 - 43 percent.

Students should be allowed to refuse to take standardized tests "designed to measure how well they are learning," 48 percent of voters say, while 47 percent say students should <u>not</u> be allowed to refuse these tests.

"Gov. Andrew Cuomo and New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio both have challenges on the education front," said Maurice Carroll, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Poll. "The governor keeps butting heads with the teachers' unions and New York State voters side with the unions.

"While New York City voters want their mayor to control their public schools, the issue is decided in Albany by the State Legislature. And those legislators, many of whom don't like Mayor de Blasio to start with, answer to voters who don't want him to keep control of the schools."

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New York State voters say 69 - 26 percent that teacher pay should <u>not</u> be based on how well students perform on standardized tests. Opposition is strong in all party, gender, age and regional groups.

By a similar 67 - 28 percent margin, voters say teacher tenure should <u>not</u> be based on test scores.

Standardized tests are \underline{not} an accurate way to measure how well students are learning, voters say 65 - 31 percent, with strong agreement among all groups.

New York State voters say 51 - 41 percent that there should be more charter schools. Support is 58 - 35 percent in New York City, with upstate voters divided 46 - 44 percent and suburban voters divided 47 - 44 percent.

Voters support 52-43 percent providing state income tax credits to individuals or companies which donate money to private schools, including religious schools.

By a larger 65 - 32 percent, voters support a \$500 state income tax credit for parents with an annual income of \$60,000 or less who pay tuition for their children to attend private schools, including religious schools. Support is strong among all groups.

From September 10 - 15, Quinnipiac University surveyed 1,366 New York State voters with a margin of error of ± 2.7 percentage points. Live interviewers call land lines and cell phones.
