**GOP IN FLUX IN FLORIDA, OHIO, PENNSYLVANIA PRIMARIES,
QUINNIPIAC UNIVERSITY SWING STATE POLL FINDS;
CLINTON SWEEPS DEM PACK, WITH BIDEN AS SECOND CHOICE**

Former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush is emerging as the Republican front-runner in an early look at possible presidential primaries in the critical swing states of Florida, Ohio and Pennsylvania, but even with Mitt Romney out of the race, Gov. Bush's only clear dominance is in his native Florida, according to a Quinnipiac University Swing State Poll released today.

In contrast, former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton is the choice of more than 50 percent of Democrats in each state, the independent Quinnipiac (KWIN-uh-pe-ack) University Poll finds. The Swing State Poll focuses on Florida, Ohio and Pennsylvania because since 1960 no candidate has won the presidential race without taking at least two of these three states.

If Clinton does not run, Vice President Joseph Biden leads the Democratic pack in Florida, Ohio and Pennsylvania, with tallies ranging from 28 percent to 39 percent.

With Romney in the race, Bush takes 30 percent of Republicans in Florida, 9 percent in Ohio and 10 percent in Pennsylvania. With Romney out, Bush gets 32 percent of Florida Republicans, 10 percent in Ohio and 12 percent in Pennsylvania. Other Republican contenders are close, or even ahead in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

"Mitt Romney's withdrawal from the presidential race, at first blush, has no statistical benefit in Florida, Ohio or Pennsylvania for any candidate for the Republican presidential nomination," said Peter A. Brown, assistant director of the Quinnipiac Poll. "From the beginning of this survey, we asked Romney supporters who they would vote for if the 2012 standard-bearer bowed out, so we are able to measure the results of that decision. Looking at the final tally, his supporters moved evenly to a variety of the remaining candidates."

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“Taken as a whole, there is no clear leader for the Republican presidential nomination in these three critical swing states. Former Gov. Jeb Bush is way ahead in Florida with almost a third of the vote, but no candidate is in comparable situation in Ohio or Pennsylvania,” Brown added. “In fact, four candidates are in low double-digits in Ohio and just three in Pennsylvania. Bush is the only one in double digits in all three states, but barely so.

“The Democratic race is the exact opposite. Hillary Clinton has an overwhelming lead and currently no serious challengers. Should she decide not to run, the field could grow like a weed. If she stays in, the numbers indicate she has nothing to worry about when it comes to the Democratic nomination.”

Florida

With Romney out of the race, Bush leads among Florida Republicans with 32 percent, followed by fellow Native Son, U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, with 15 percent, former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee with 11 percent. No other candidate tops 9 percent and 8 percent remain undecided.

Clinton leads the Democratic pack in Florida with 61 percent, followed by Vice President Biden with 11 percent and U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts with 9 percent. No other candidate tops 2 percent and 10 percent are undecided.

If Clinton bows out, Biden leads with 39 percent, followed by Warren with 22 percent. No other candidate is over 3 percent and 23 percent are undecided.

“Former Gov. Jeb Bush’s home state lead among Republicans is impressive. With U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio getting 15 percent, almost half the Florida GOP electorate backs a home state candidate. If Rubio, who has yet to make up his mind, decides not to run, that would give Bush a huge leg up in the nation’s most populous swing state. If Rubio does run it will set up a home-state battle between a mentor, Bush, and his protégé, Rubio,” Brown said.

Ohio

Gov. John Kasich’s Native Son support wins him 14 percent of Ohio Republicans in a Romney-free primary race. Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker has 11 percent, with 10 percent each for Bush and U.S. Sen. Rand Paul. No other candidate tops 8 percent and 20 percent are undecided.

Clinton takes 51 percent of Ohio Democrats, with 14 percent for Warren and 7 percent for Biden. No other candidate tops 5 percent and 15 percent are undecided.

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If Clinton doesn't run, Biden gets 28 percent, with 24 percent for Warren and 28 percent undecided.

“The big question in Ohio is whether Gov. John Kasich runs. If so, the data indicates that he would be a formidable competitor in his home state. This Swing State Poll, however, indicates that he has a long, long way to go in Florida and Pennsylvania,” Brown said.

Pennsylvania

With Romney out of the running, it's a real horse race among Pennsylvania Republicans, with 12 percent for Bush, 11 percent for New Jersey Gov. Christopher Christie and 10 percent for former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee. No other candidate tops 8 percent and 22 percent are undecided.

Clinton leads among Democrats with 54 percent, followed by 12 percent for Warren and 10 percent for Biden. No other candidate tops 2 percent and 15 percent are undecided.

With Clinton out of the race, Biden gets 34 percent of Pennsylvania Democrats, with 21 percent for Warren.

“Hillary Clinton needs binoculars to find a challenger in the Pennsylvania Democratic primary. Even Scranton-born Vice President Joseph Biden is just a blip out there somewhere,” said Tim Malloy, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Poll.

“The GOP race is all over the political map, with Governors Jeb Bush, Christopher Christie and Mike Huckabee jostling for the lead.”

From January 22 – February 1 Quinnipiac University surveyed:

- 936 Florida voters with a margin of error of +/- 3.2 percent. The survey includes 348 registered Republicans with a margin of error of +/- 5.3 percent and 322 registered Democrats with a margin of error of +/- 5.5 percent.
- 943 Ohio voters with a margin of error of +/- 3.2 percent. This includes 337 registered Republicans with a margin of error of +/- 5.3 percent and 315 registered Democrats with a margin of error of +/- 5.5 percent.
- 881 Pennsylvania voters with a margin of error of +/- 3.3 percent. This includes 342 registered Republicans with a margin of error of +/- 5.3 percent and 392 registered Democrats with a margin of error of +/- 5 percent
